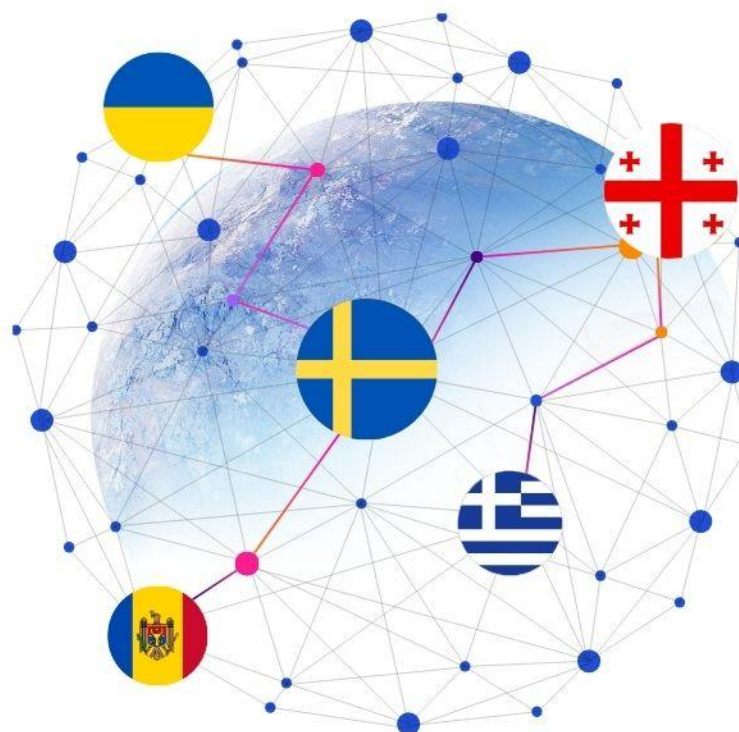


VirtuallyEDU 2.0 Officially Launches

VirtuallyEDU 2.0 is a 36-month Virtual Exchange project connecting universities and youth organizations from Ukraine, Moldova, Georgia, Greece, Sweden, and other European countries. The initiative promotes international collaboration and intercultural learning.

The project addresses challenges related to artificial intelligence, digital misinformation, and the growing need for critical digital skills among young people. It helps participants better understand and navigate today's digital world.

Through innovative online activities, VirtuallyEDU 2.0 develops AI literacy, media resilience, civic engagement, and intercultural communication. It encourages responsible use of AI and active participation in shaping a fair and inclusive digital future.
